## **NAPLAN 2023**

The dates of NAPLAN test has changed this year, and will be held between 15<sup>th</sup> March - 27<sup>th</sup> March 2023. The school has implemented several strategies to prepare students well for the NAPLAN tests. Parents are requested to ensure students do sufficient revision work at home and report to school for the tests.

The month of Ramadan - the month of blessing and mercy is starting soon. A Ramadan assembly will be held prior to the starting of the month. A special Ramadan Newsletter will be issued soon to provide further details about school finishing times.

#### **Students Attendance**

that Children of compulsory school-age are required to be enrolled in, and attend, the school regularly and punctually. In line with this Act the AICS requires all children to come to school regularly and punctually. Only the Principal has the authority to give permission to a child to be absent for any reason other than illness or other should not be made. unforeseen circumstances.

When a child is sick, parents are required to inform the school about the child's absence and reasons for the absence between 8.00 am and 8.30 a.m. On returning to school after the absence the child should bring a note from parents explaining the absence.

When a child needs to be absent for reasons other than illness, parents need to fill in a form (obtainable from the school website), requesting for leave from the Principal at least a month in advance. The Principal will consider the request and convey his decision to the parents. Please note that this procedure needs to be strictly followed.

From 2015, under changes to the government legislation, any family holiday taken during term time is not permitted unless there are exceptional and unavoidable circumstances as defined by the criteria below:

- misadventure or unforeseen event
- domestic necessity such as serious illness of an immediate family member
- attendance at funerals of immediate family

members.

The College has the delegated ministerial authority under section 25 of the Act not to permit The Education Act (1990) (Education Act) states leave to students without unexpected and unavoidable circumstances mentioned above.

> Therefore, parents are strongly advised **not to** plan take children on holidays during the school terms. Leave requests for general holidays or travel related to holidays are not granted during term time and applications for such leaves

Long absence from school results in children missing considerable amount of school work. This adversely affects their learning and academic progress when they return to school.

The Years 11 and 12 students are required to fulfil specific attendance and work coverage requirements in order to sit for HSC examinations. Absence from school for long periods may prevent these students from meeting the requirements and thus preventing them from appearing for HSC examinations. All parents and guardians are requested to read the 'Student's Leave Policy' sent to you recently and follow the directives contained in it.

I am looking forward to the cooperation and support of all parents and guardians in developing a highly rigorous and disciplined school culture at AICS built upon scholarship, integrity and excellence.

#### Attendance

Our young children require a lot of assistance when using the online apps. They need support with a range of skills including: to interact safely and appropriately with others, to protect themselves and their personal identity, searching skills and reporting to an adult when they feel unsafe or uncomfortable.

Most of the social media apps are not approved for **children under 13 years old**, however I know many of our students frequently use these apps, **including Tick Tock**, **Instagram**, **Snap Chat (and many others)**. The eSafety Commissioner has a fantastic website that has a lot of support for parents, children and teachers. If you have visited the website in the past, please revisit it as they are always updating the information and resources. They even have a button for you or your child to report abuse.

Here are some things you can do as a parent to make sure your child feels ready for the annual NAPLAN test:

#### **Tips For Handling Test Anxiety**

Making sure your child is prepared for the test will help them to feel less anxious about it. There are some other techniques you can use to minimise their anxiety on test day and the days leading up to it, including the following:

#### Talk to Them About the Test Structure

You can do a lot to assuage your child's test anxiety by talking to them about what to expect from the test. The following are some basic things your child ought to know about NAPLAN:

#### Questions are multiple choice and short answers;

The Language Conventions tests assess your child's ability to spell and use Standard Australian English.

The **Numeracy** tests evaluate their ability to solve problems with and without a calculator (depending on their year)

The **Reading** tests assess their ability to decode words and infer information from a test; it also tests their vocabulary

The **Writing** test assesses your child's ability to appeal to an audience and use proper sentence structure, grammar, and spelling.

#### Ensure Your Child Get a Good Night's Sleep

It's also essential to ensure your child gets a good night's sleep the night before the test. Ensure they go to bed on time and eliminate screen usage before bed to help them rest well.

#### Stick to Their Normal Routine

It's best to stick to their regular routine the morning of your test. Encourage them to eat breakfast and do everything they'd typically do. This will help to put them at ease and keep them from getting worked up about the test.

#### Use Positive Language

When you talk about the best, always use positive language and make sure your tone is encouraging. Talk to your child about the importance of positive thinking and positive self-talk, too.

#### Teach Them Relaxation Exercises

It might also be helpful to teach your child some relaxation exercises that they can do before they take the test.





#### Hello!

KB has been extremely busy since starting kindergarten this year. We have been learning about the letters S, A, and T and the numbers 1-10. Kindergarten starts every day with a game we call 'cars'. They stand in a line, click on their seatbelts (safety first!), adjust their mirrors, put on their sunglasses, say 'I look fabulous', start their engines, and hold onto their steering wheels. We then drive around the room going over the days of the week as a class, with a beep, beep after Saturday! It is amazing how KB now knows the days of the week – well done KB!

In reading, we can identify how many syllables are in a word. We can also sound out a word and attempt to read it ourselves. We know the cover, title, author, and illustrator of a book and explain that it is important for illustrations to match the text, as it helps us to read unknown words.

We have learned to independently write our names, ensuring that we use a capital letter for only the first letter of our name. We have also discussed topics such as the meaning of 'unique' in Health and explored 'Living Things' in Science.

In art we have learned about Vincent Van Gogh in Art, drawing his sunflowers. As well as doing dot painting, just like the Indigenous Australians.

## **Year 2 News**



## **Year 3 News**







## **Year 6 News**



## **Premiers Reading Challenge 2023**



# **HSIE Department**

We have hit the ground running in the HSIE Department for 2023! There are so many wonderful initiatives in the works behind the scenes that we are all very excited about. The HSIE Team for 2023 consists of Ms Aamina Younis, Ms Fatema Faqeery, Ms Mariam Oganesian, Mr Rovindra Deo, Ms Tayyibha Hussein, Ms Waseema Jahan and Ms Zuhra Hashimi. This flexible and versatile team bring a wealth of experience with them to the College. We are all looking forward to a successful year. We have also recently had Ms Demetria Dixon leave us to go on maternity leave, we wish her and her family all the very best with their new bundle of joy.

The HSIE Department offers a variety of subjects across all stages in the Secondary school. **Geography** and **History** are offered to all students in Years 7 to 10, **Commerce** and **Work Education** is offered for Year 9 and 10 elective students, and students in Years 11 and 12 have a variety of options including **Ancient History**, **Business Studies**, **Economics**, **Legal Studies**, **Society and Culture** and **Studies of Religion**.

#### Term 1 2023 - HSIE Subject Focus

- Year 7 Geography students are investigating features and characteristics of places across a range of scales that support and enhance people's wellbeing such as community identity, environmental quality and access to services and facilities.
- Year 8 History Students investigate a range of depth studies from the end of the ancient period to the beginning of the modern world (c. 650–1750 ad). During this period, major civilisations around the world came into contact with each other.
- Year 9 Geography Students examine the physical characteristics and productivity of biomes. Students examine the correlation between the world's climatic zones and spatial distributions of biomes and their capacity to support food and non-food agricultural production.
- Year 9 Commerce Students learn how to identify and research issues that individuals encounter when making consumer and financial decisions. They investigate laws and mechanisms that protect consumers including the process of consumer redress.
- Year 9 Work Education provides students with opportunities to develop knowledge and understanding of the
  world of work, including its dynamic and diverse nature. Students prepare for the working world by developing an understanding of the roles of education, training and employment, and an appreciation of the role of lifelong learning in
  career development and managing transitions.
- Year 10 History students are investigating the impacts of the Industrial Revolution including mass movement of people through voluntary and involuntary migration. The unit will look into convict and settler experiences.
- Year 10 Commerce Students develop an understanding of the importance, and features of, the economic environment, including markets. They explore the nature, role and operation of businesses in the context of an increasingly globalised economy.

# **HSIE Department**

- Year 11/12 Ancient History This course provides students with opportunities to develop and apply their understanding of methods and issues involved in the investigation of the ancient past. Through archaeological and written sources, students study of a range of features, people, places, events and developments of the ancient world.
- Year 11/12 Business Studies This course provides students with opportunities to develop an understanding of how
  theoretical and practical aspects of business combine. Students study contemporary business issues through case
  studies and apply their knowledge to problems encountered in the business environment.
- Year 11/12 Economics This course provides students with opportunities to learn about the challenges and issues in
  a contemporary Australian economic context. Students develop their analytical, problem-solving and communication
  skills to make informed judgements about economic issues.
- Year 11/12 Legal Studies This course provides students with opportunities to develop their knowledge and understanding of the nature and functions of law and law-making, the development of Australian and international legal systems, the Australian constitution and law reform. Students investigate the key areas of law, justice and human rights through a variety of focus studies which consider how changes in societies influence law reform.
- Year 11/12 Society and Culture This course provides students with opportunities to develop social and cultural literacy and understand how interactions shape human behaviour. Drawing on cross-disciplinary concepts and social and cultural research methods, students undertake research in an area of particular interest to them and present their findings for external assessment in the Personal Interest Project (PIP).
- Year 11/12 Studies of Religion This course provides students with opportunities to develop their understanding and critical awareness of the nature and significance of religion and the influence of belief systems and religious traditions on individuals and within society.

This is an exciting year for all our prospective Geographers, Historians, Entrepreneurs, Sociologists and Lawyers. The HSIE Department is looking forward to all the wonderful achievements that our students will produce.
